Thirty-First Sunday of Ordinary Time

November 5, 2023

Dear Parishioners,

The following is from an article by Father Michael Van Sloun, about the importance of praying for the dead, entitled: “All Souls Day: Why should we pray for the dead?” (11/1/2010): *“November 2 is All Souls Day, the special day in the liturgical year set aside to pray for the dead. But why pray for the dead? There is no need to pray for those who have died and gone straight to heaven. This feast presumes that some who die are imperfectly purified of their sin-fulness, and while assured of the eventual benefits of eternal life, are barred from immediate access to heaven. Instead, they are held in an unknown place where they are cleansed of their sinfulness, and after an indeterminate time, are finally released to take their place at God’s throne. For centuries, Catholics have said that purgatory is the intermediate place of temporary punishment and purification, and that the length of time spent there is based upon the number and seriousness of one’s sins. The church defined this doctrine at the Second Council of Lyons (1274), the Council of Florence (1439) and the Council of Trent (1545-1563). The term, purgatory, still exists in church literature today (Catechism of the Catholic Church, No. 1030-1032) despite the fact that it is not mentioned in the Bible. Two New Testament verses allude to a cleansing fire (1 Corinthians 3:15 and 1 Peter 1:7), and they have served as the basis for the concept of purgatory, which evolved from the fifth to thirteenth centuries. A key biblical basis for praying for the dead is found in the Old Testament (2 Maccabees 12:38-46). This story recounts how Judas Maccabeus, a great Jewish general of the second century before Christ, successfully led his army into battle. A day after hostilities ceased, the troops who survived returned to the battlefield to gather up the bodies to give them a respectful burial. To their horror, they found amulets, protective charm necklaces sacred to the idols of Jamnia, local pagan gods, tied around their necks and hidden under their armor. This was a grave sin against the First Commandment’s law against*

idols (Exodus 20:2-6; Deuteronomy 5:7-9). Immediately “they turned to supplication and prayed that the sinful deed might be blotted out” (2 Maccabees 12:42). As firm believers in the resurrection, they were confident their prayers could help atone for the sins of the dead, release them, the survivors took up a collection and sent it to Jerusalem so an expiatory sacrifice could be offered in from the punishment they deserved, and speed them on their journey to eternal light and peace. Consistent with this ancient Jewish practice, the Catholic Church has taught for centuries that our prayers serve as an aid to those who have died, and the premier prayer to offer for their intention is the Eucharist, the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. The church also recommends alms-giving, indulgences and other works of penance for the deceased (Catechism, No. 1032).”

Throughout this month of November, please consider reserving some time to pray for the dead, specifically having Masses offered for them. God Bless!

THE MESSAGE, NOT THE MESSENGER

“We thank God constantly that in receiving His message from us you took it, not as the word of men, but as it truly is, the word of God.” —1 Thessalonians 2:13

As a teenager, I attended daily Masses said by Father O’Hare (not his real name). His style rubbed me the wrong way; it was hard for me to concentrate on his homilies. God used him to teach me to concentrate on the message, not the messenger (1 Thes 2:13). Here are some words of God from various “disturbing” messengers over the years that have stayed with me:

Sin is serious. Repent immediately (Mk 1:15). We Catholics have the greatest news ever. We need to share this news with everyone (Mk 16:15).

“He Who has begun the good work in you will carry it through to completion” (Phil 1:6). You have to work for justice if you call yourself Christian.

Jesus loves you passionately. Why can’t you love Him?

Here is how you wait on the Lord: “you just wait.”

The infant Jesus lies in a manger, a feeding trough. By this God shows us that Jesus is Food for us (Jn 6:55).

Teach the truth (Jn 17:17).

God uses all kinds of messengers to speak His words to us (see e.g. Mal 3:1). He may speak His most profound messages through the messenger we least want to hear. How about you? What words of God can you list from messengers whose style you disliked? What messages of God are you missing?

Prayer: Father, use anyone You want to teach me anything You want. Open my ears that I may hear You at all times.

Promise: “The greatest among you will be the one who serves the rest.” —Mt 23:11

Praise: Alleluia! Jesus has risen and will raise me from the dead!

Queridos feligreses,

Lo siguiente es de un artículo del Padre Michael Van Sloun, sobre la importancia de orar por los muertos, titulado: "Día de los Difuntos: ¿Por qué debemos orar por los muertos?" (1/11/2010): *"El 2 de noviembre es el Día de los Difuntos, el día especial del año litúrgico reservado para orar por los muertos. Pero ¿por qué rezar por los muertos? No hay necesidad de orar por aquellos que han muerto y han ido directamente al cielo. Esta fiesta supone que algunos de los que mueren están imperfectamente purificados de sus pecados y, aunque se les aseguran los beneficios eventuales de la vida eterna, se les prohíbe el acceso inmediato al cielo. En cambio, son retenidos en un lugar desconocido donde son limpiados de sus pecados y, después de un tiempo indeterminado, finalmente son liberados para ocupar su lugar en el trono de Dios. Durante siglos, los Católicos han dicho que el purgatorio es el lugar intermedio de castigo y purificación temporal, y que el tiempo que se pasa allí se basa en el número y la gravedad de los pecados de cada uno. La Iglesia definió esta doctrina en el Segundo Concilio de Lyon (1274), el Concilio de Florencia (1439) y el Concilio de Trento (1545-1563). El término purgatorio todavía existe en la literatura eclesialística de hoy (Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica, No. 1030-1032) a pesar de que no se menciona en la Biblia. Dos versículos del Nuevo Testamento aluden a un fuego purificador (1 Corintios 3:15 y 1 Pedro 1:7), y han servido de base para el concepto de purgatorio, que evolucionó entre los siglos V y XIII. Una base bíblica clave para orar por los muertos se encuentra en el Antiguo Testamento (2 Macabeos 12:38-46). Esta historia relata cómo Judas Macabeo, un gran general judío del siglo II antes de Cristo, condujo con éxito a su ejército a la batalla. Un día después del cese de las hostilidades, las tropas que sobrevivieron regresaron al campo de batalla para recoger los cuerpos y darles un entierro respetuoso. Para su horror, encontraron amuletos, collares de amuletos protectores sagrados para los ídolos de Jamnia, dioses paganos locales, atados alrededor de sus cuellos y escondidos debajo de sus armaduras. Este fue un pecado grave contra la ley del Primer Mandamiento contra los ídolos (Éxodo 20:2-6; Deuteronomio 5:7-9). Inmediatamente "se pusieron a suplicar y rogaron que el pecado fuera borrado" (2 Macabeos 12:42). Como firmes creyentes en la resurrección, confiaban en que sus oraciones*

podrían ayudar a expiar los pecados de los muertos, liberarlos, los sobrevivientes tomaron una colecta y la enviaron a Jerusalén para que se pudiera ofrecer un sacrificio expiatorio del castigo que merecían, y acelerarlos en su viaje hacia la luz y la paz eternas. De acuerdo con esta antigua práctica judía, la Iglesia Católica ha enseñado durante siglos que nuestras oraciones sirven como ayuda para aquellos que han muerto, y la principal oración que podemos ofrecer por su intención es la Eucaristía, el Santo Sacrificio de la Misa. La iglesia también recomienda limosnas, indulgencias y otras obras de penitencia por los difuntos (Catecismo, n. 1032)". A lo largo de este mes de Noviembre, considere reservar algo de tiempo para orar por los muertos, específicamente para ofrecer Misas por ellos. Dios los bendiga!

EL MENSAJE, NO EL MENSAJERO

"No cesamos de dar gracias a Dios, porque cuando recibieron la Palabra que les predicamos, ustedes la aceptaron no como palabra humana, sino como lo que es realmente, como Palabra de Dios" (1 Tesalonicenses 2:13).

Cuando era adolescente, asistía a misas diarias dichas por el Padre O'Hare (no es su nombre real). Su estilo no me gustaba; fue difícil para mí concentrarme en sus homilías. Dios lo usó para enseñarme a concentrarme en el mensaje, no en el mensajero (1 Tes 2:13). Aquí hay algunas palabras de Dios de varios mensajeros "perturbadores" que se han quedado conmigo a lo largo de los años:

- El pecado es grave. Arrepentíos inmediatamente (Mc 1:15).
- Nosotros los católicos tenemos la mejor noticia de todos los tiempos. Necesitamos compartir esta noticia con todos (Mc 16:15).
- "Que aquel que comenzó en ustedes la buena obra la irá completando hasta el Día de Cristo Jesús" (Fil 1:6).
- Tienes que trabajar por la justicia si te llamas cristiano.
- Jesús te ama apasionadamente. ¿Por qué no puedes amarlo?
- Así es como esperas en el Señor: "solo espera".
- El niño Jesús yace en un pesebre, un comedero. Con esto Dios nos muestra que Jesús es alimento para nosotros (Jn 6:55).
- Enseñar la verdad (Jn 17:17).

Dios usa toda clase de mensajeros para comunicarnos Sus palabras (véase, por ejemplo, Mal 3:1). Él puede expresar Sus mensajes más profundos mediante el mensajero que menos queremos escuchar. ¿Y tú? ¿Qué palabras de Dios puedes enumerar de mensajeros cuyo estilo no te gustaba? ¿Qué mensajes de Dios te estás perdiendo?

Oración: Padre, usa a quien quieras para que me enseñe lo que quieras. Abre mis oídos para que pueda oírte en todo momento.

Promesa: "Que el más grande de entre ustedes se haga el servidor de los otros" (Mt 23:11).

50° ANIVERSARIO DE LA ORDENACIÓN SACERDOTAL

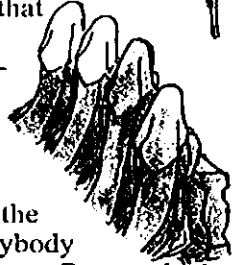

Still, there are some people who do wear special clothes and should get places of honour. Priests and religious sisters and brothers wear clothes that help us to know that they have special jobs. They aren't trying to get attention, but it is a sign that they have given themselves to God. We treat them with extra respect because they have dedicated their lives to God.

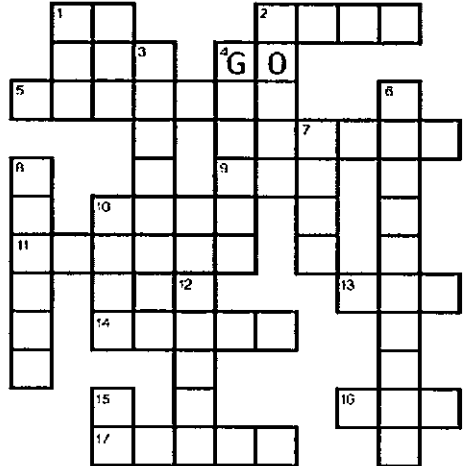
